

PRINCIPAL'S NOTE

IB HEADS OF SCHOOL CONFERENCE IN THE HAGUE

I will be attending the IB Heads of School Conference at The Hague during the last week of October. The theme for this conference is: the IB Community - Shaping the World.

The IB curriculum adds a significant dimension to the college community and its philosophy underpins the delivery of all our curriculum offerings.

At this conference the sessions will challenge all participants to think about how our schools, our staff, our students, our alumni – our IB community – can or is shaping the world.

As part of my professional learning on this trip, I will also visit academics at the university in Helsinki to develop an understanding of one of the world's most effective education systems.

I will share key messages on my return.

SRA –STUDENT RESOURCE ALLOCATION

The Education and Training Directorate will be implementing a needs-based school funding model to start in 2016. The transition period will be from 2016-2018.

The driving force of this new model is that in the ACT every child, young person and adult will benefit from a high quality, accessible education, childcare and training system.

There has been extensive consultation and our Board Chair and I attended a workshop run by KPMG about making this model the best it can be for all our schools.

I have had significant input as a member of the SRA Advisory Group. I will keep our community informed during the implementation process of this model.

WHAT'S IMPORTANT TO STUDENTS BEGINNING SESSION 3?

All students have now received their results from session 2 and hopefully they have reflected on the

feedback given in the assessment tasks and in their reports with the view to improve their outcomes.

Our year 12 students have only one session left. They do need to maintain the focus on their studies while exploring post college options including scholarships. At this time of year there is a frenzy of signing off for university applications particularly in the fields of medicine, dentistry and engineering. Our students are aiming high and many will get into these highly sought after disciplines.

We believe that our year 12 students are ready to take on the post college challenges. At this college students' learning of curriculum has been inextricably linked with advances in technology and now they are ready to adapt and thrive with highly developed interpersonal and communication skills as well as critical reasoning and analytical skills.

For year 12 students, BSSS policy states that if a student has already completed a course: the course score calculation at that point cannot be lowered as a result of the last unit score. Importantly it can be improved by gaining a good result. On this basis I encourage all year 12 students to do their best in all units this session and finish their secondary study on a very positive note.

For students in both year groups the performance in all units this session can make a difference to their score.

ATAR ESTIMATES

Year 12 students aiming for university in 2016 should already have an ATAR estimate and I'm sure all students know that the Universities Admissions Centres applications close on Wednesday 30 September. A late fee is incurred if the deadline is not met. Applications to CIT are on-line and also should be lodged as soon as possible.

IB EXAMS

Students undertaking the International Baccalaureate exams commence their 'stuvac' on 23 October. Examinations commence on 3 November and conclude on 24 November. We wish all students well in their exams after two intense years of work.

UN DAY

The annual college UN Day is to be held on Friday 23 October from 11.00-1.00pm. It is a highlight in our calendar. The day allows students to showcase their culture and perform and appreciate other cultures. Students, staff and parents always comment very positively on the day. I encourage you to attend and enjoy the day with your son/daughter.

P & C TRIVIA NIGHT

Please come along to the P & C Trivia Night to be held here on 5 November. This is the fourth year of this significant fundraiser and a great opportunity to connect with our community.

YEAR 12 FORMAL 2015

The College Formal is set for **Thursday 26 November** at the **Great Hall, Parliament House**.

Students may start arriving at 6.30pm, although entry to the new Parliament House is not until 6:50pm.

The **tickets** cost **\$160.00** and must be presented at the Formal for checking. Tickets will be on sale at the College's front reception from **Monday 14 September** till **Friday 6 November**.

This year due to the venue of the Formal and strict security at new Parliament House there will be **no area for arrivals**. Students and guests are to be dropped off in the underground car park of new Parliament House or at the top of Federation Mall. Students are to make their way to the front entrance via the front forecourt. Family and friends are welcome to join students and guests in the forecourt. However, entry through security to Parliament House is restricted to Formal ticket holders only. Pre-formal drinks will commence in the Marble Foyer at 7:00pm before entering the Great Hall at 7:30pm for dinner.

Please note: ALL students need to have made transport arrangements to leave the Formal venue – including the car park, by 11.45pm. There will be no college supervision beyond this time.

Remember, **dress** is fitting for a formal occasion. In the past, male students who have not hired formal suits have chosen to wear smart casual shirts and trousers, with or without ties.

The price of the ticket includes a three course meal, soft drink package, one free photo taken on the night and access to a photo booth.

The Formal is organised by the college with staff attending. Of course normal college rules apply so alcohol and other illicit substances are not tolerated and if you breach the rules you will be sent home.

Narrabundah College has established an excellent reputation for exemplary behaviour at past Formals. This has resulted in successful and very enjoyable memorable evenings for everyone.

Most institutions that participate in the Universities Admissions Centre (UAC) have an Educational Access Scheme (EAS) for applicants who have experienced long term educational disadvantage. The forms require considerable supporting documentation and there is also a section which must be filled in by the school. Students should check their eligibility to apply for this as soon as possible. Universities in other states have similar schemes. Some universities this year are also offering a School Recommendation Scheme (SRS) where the college can support the application of students who might just miss out on the cut-off for certain courses. Both these additional applications must be completed by students as soon as possible – information on both is on the UAC website.

It is extremely important that year 12 students check their package and in particular do not void units. The loss of points and/or subjects could jeopardise their eligibility for an ATAR or Year 12 Certificate. Some students have had approval to undertake 4 lines of study in this last quadrimester at the college as they have completed more than a full time load at some stage over the past two years. However, care needs to be taken not to void any of these units, as the approval has been granted on the understanding of staff, parents and students that students will complete all 4 lines. If a student is in any doubt whatsoever as to where they stand as far as their package is concerned, they should consult their adviser as soon as possible. Updated ATAR estimates that include the last session are now available from the advisers.

Year 12

Students heading into university study for 2016 should be applying to the university admission centres across Australia by Wednesday 30 September 2015. You are still able to apply after this date but a late fee will be charged. All students should have at least registered with each of the admissions centres in each state and put down some preferences of courses. These preferences can be changed right up to early January 2016, and certainly can be changed after students receive their actual ATAR on December 16.

Year 11

Parents of some Year 11 students may be called in for an interview after the October holidays if there are significant problems/issues or concerns regarding attendance and/or progress. We have noticed more and more students trying to organise their classes over a reduced number of lines. We have a seven line timetable created to maximise flexibility and diversity of curriculum offerings. Students should avoid timetabling work and other out of college commitments during school hours as we cannot guarantee subjects if line choices are restricted.

At the end of this year we will be holding 3-way parent/teacher/student interviews as a review of progress throughout Year 11. Parents will be asked to book a meeting in college hours from 7-9 December that will involve either the student's adviser or an executive teacher. This meeting will provide the opportunity to check progress and make decisions about areas to focus on for Year 12 to ensure each student makes the most of their time at the college.

2XX RADIO TRAINING COURSE 2015
26/27 September and Oct 10/11

Students have the opportunity to receive training in radio station and presenting at 2XXFM. For experienced students already hosting NbC there is Media Law: and Offsite Broadcast (OB) training available for those who already have Basic Training.

Basic training will be with Jenni Atkinson at the station. 9 – 1.30 pm. Completing this course qualifies you to present on 2XXFM and is generally recognized experience at other community stations and media organisations. The training covers radio panelling, radio presenting technique, basic audio editing, content development, segment principals, interviewing techniques and media law. The next training dates are 26/27 September and Oct 10/11. Payment of \$110 will be to 2XX.

On Saturday students will be able to stay and watch the NbC Radio show from 6 – 8 pm. This is our college radio show, which has been broadcasting for 4 years this October!

Additional training:

Offsite Broadcasting - for those who want to learn how to plan, set up, host, and pack down the 2XXFM out of studio and on site field recording set up. This unit is a great chance to learn about sound tech equipment and how media organisations bring their work out to the public. It is taught by our head technician David Howe. These sessions are \$70 per person or \$50 concession. The next scheduled Offsite Broadcast Training dates are: **Saturday September 12th, Saturday October 10th, and Saturday November 14th.**

Please let **Celia Stott in Humanities** know if you are interested in either or the courses above. You may receive community R points or SWL points towards your Certificate 11 in Creative Industries (Media). Places are limited, and this is the last training available for 2015. CREATIVE ART NEWS

Luis AP, a year 12 Creative Art student was inspired by the Principal's address at the most recent school assembly. Kerrie Grundy referenced an article in the ANU Reporter concentrating on the links between the modern era of technology and the state of depression among young adults. Luis created a series of oil paintings reflecting this topical issue.



Luis has described his series of paintings, *The Youth's Dark Night*, as "In this modern era, the state of depression lingers commonly among teenagers and young adults, especially during the very late night or early morning, where they are prone to using their mobile devices or computers for social media or entertainment purposes. This situation is portrayed by the three black and white oil-painted portraits of very distinguishable teenagers, each having only one source of light in the dark coming from different positions and sizes. Each of them differ from one another with a pale male casually using his phone below, where a silhouetted of the device is visible on his neck, then a tanned female calling someone with her phone by the side of her head, finally a boy using the computer, which is shown through the reflection from his eyeglasses. Inspired from the Italian art style 'Chiaroscuro', which defines an artwork that consists of a strong use of contrasts between lights and darks, the youth appear differently from when they are under the sunlight from


above or in front of them. This context also displays a metaphor on how each of them may appear happy and cheerful during the day and light, but gloomy and depressed during the dark late night. The dark negative space surrounding each of the individuals not only suggests the time at which this event occurs, but also adds a more sorrowful sensation for the viewers and it also strengthens the emotion of depression present amongst the subjects' facial expression."

MAGPIE SWOOPING SEASON

TAMS have produced a short video they have asked us to share with schools as it might be useful for teachers and perhaps sharing with parents.

This video provides advice on what precautions to take during magpie swooping season.

For most of the year magpies are a wonderful part of life in the bush capital. If there is a swooping bird in your neighbourhood you can take these simple measures to protect yourself. Wear a hat. Wear glasses to protect your eyes. Walk your bike and don't run. Take an umbrella on your walk. You can also watch the magpie when you are going through its territory as they are less likely to swoop if you are keeping your eye on them. And always keep your dog on a lead when walking through a magpie's territory. If possible, take a different route.
