PRINCIPAL'S NOTE

WHY IS THE CULTURE OF NARRABUNDAH COLLEGE UNIQUE?

On Thursday morning week 3 we hosted students from our local high schools and other schools around the ACT to our Information Morning. A significant number of our students volunteered to be guides for this event and they shared their positive experiences as members of this community with our prospective students. The music student performances in the quad were a success as was the sausage sizzle.

The students who visited the college commented on the welcoming vibe created by students and staff, the different curriculum areas they visited, how they loved the diversity of offerings and the choices they will be able to make to suit their learning journey in years 11 and 12.

We welcomed hundreds of visitors to the college for our Information Night. Prospective students and their parents embraced the college experience and were able to meet with teachers and students in all faculty areas to ask specific questions about our college.

At all these events we showcased the educational, emotional and social opportunities that this college offers our students.

As the Principal of a school delivering the International Baccalaureate, I have the opportunity to attend professional learning run by the IBO. At the recent IB online conference the focus was very much on Future Skills: the New Paradigm with a future focussing on hybrid learning, everyone leveraging technology and students curating their learning experience. This openness to learning requires a commitment to learn, integrity, and resilience: it is okay to fail in order to learn how to handle future experiences.

The IB is woven into our curriculum which enables all our students to be well prepared for the university experience with well-developed problem-solving skills, an openness to learning and the ability to curate and maximise their learning journey.

A year ago, we were focussed on managing our students' learning online and off site due to COVID 19. Students and teachers did pick up fabulous skills through COVID which have since been incorporated into our learning environment in many ways. Our students can and will definitely draw on their new skill set essential for their ongoing learning journey.

ENROLMENTS FOR 2022

Interest for places at the college for 2022 is already strong. College principals undertake the selection process for the next year's student enrolment using the ACT Education Directorate enrolment policy and criteria. Information on this process is on the Education Directorate's website (www.education.act.gov.au) and I encourage any prospective students and their families to understand

the process fully. Students living in the priority enrolment area are guaranteed a place at Narrabundah College as are concurrent siblings. Usually up to 55% of our enrolments are out of area and prospective students need to demonstrate well supported reasons in their applications citing for example curriculum reasons and well-being reasons. If any parents or students looking to come to the college in 2022 need further information about the process, please contact the college. Enrolments close on 5.00pm, Friday, 4 June.

NEXT INFORMATION EVENING FOR PARENTS AND CARERS

To support parents with their understanding of the ACT senior secondary system, the college holds a series of information sessions throughout the year. The first of these, “*What do your scores and grades mean?*”, was held on 20 April and was very well attended again this year. We hope the meeting helped families better understand the information provided on reports and also on the BSSS printouts students regularly receive. We are holding another parent information session explaining in detail the formation of a student’s Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR), 15 June at 6.00pm. Your attendance and questions at these sessions are most welcome.

Notifications made over the phone cannot be accepted.

SERAPHINA NICHOLLS' JOURNEY FROM CANBERRA TO MELBOURNE



Seraphina Nicholls followed in her parents' footsteps to join Trinity College in Melbourne and says the experience has already opened up many friendships and opportunities, even during lockdown.

'My mum just speaks of college so fondly,' says Narrabundah College alumna Seraphina Nicholls as she explains how she came to live at Trinity College at the University of Melbourne. Seraphina's parents met at Trinity as students, and her mum had often shared tales of how formative the experience of living on campus was.

Seraphina had gotten another taste of college life through her mum's work at Burgmann College in Canberra and knew that college was something she really wanted to experience.

While Seraphina loves Canberra and credits Narrabundah for setting her up for university so well, she wanted a new adventure, so decided to move to Melbourne after finishing high school. She liked the range of degrees offered by the University of Melbourne, and also wanted to experience the sense of community that comes with on-campus living.

'I think it's better to be living around people; likeminded people who are doing the same things as you because you get a better understanding of how you orientate yourself amongst the opinions of others,' says Seraphina.

Seraphina admits her introduction to college life was a little strange however, as she arrived at Trinity in 2020 in the midst of one of Melbourne's lockdowns.

'I didn't know anyone, some people had left, and we weren't doing the whole events thing,' she says. 'But that being said, I'm really grateful for that experience because everyone just became so close. And whilst it was a difficult time, especially coming from interstate where the [COVID-19] situation was different, it was really nice to develop this comradery with one another as you all had this shared experience. I think it was testament to the community, because people would go out of their way to be friends with you and make you feel included in the community.'

Now that Seraphina has an established network of friends, she's enjoying getting into the swing of on-campus life. 'I'm already involved in the ball committee, which I'm really excited about. We're in the middle of organising [the college ball] and I think it's going to be a lot of fun.' On top of that, she has applied to join a number of other committees and is trying out for different sports and the musical. 'It's just all there for you.'

Seraphina is taking an arts degree at the University of Melbourne and is planning to major in art history and media and communications, while also taking a diploma in French. She thinks Melbourne is the perfect place to pursue this kind of study, given the vibrant arts and cultural scene, and notes that it's good to see the things she's learning about in real life.

'For example, when I'm doing art history, it's like, "Oh cool, I can just go down to the national gallery and then see the paintings that I'm talking about." I love the city and there's always so much going on.'

To anyone considering moving to Melbourne from interstate, Seraphina's advice is to step out of your comfort zone. 'Don't be oppositional to try new things and just really extend yourself and see what life would be like, say in another state or in another way of living,' she says. 'I'd just encourage people to apply and then to involve yourself in a bigger city with a lot going on, because there are so many opportunities out there.'

YEAR 11 SCIENCE: NUMERICAL AND EXPERIMENTAL PROJECT

At the beginning of the college year, Year 11 French Baccalauréat students were challenged by their two science teachers to undertake an experimental science project.

This experimental science project consists of students exploring a relevant and intriguing scientific question through the use of sensors.

Although there is some guidance in terms of possible subject selection, students in groups of 3-4 are left to their own devices to determine the nature of their project, logistics, execution of experiments and overall success of their research.

The final aim of this project, named "Projet Numérique et Expérimental" in French, is for students in their groups to present their project and their findings to a panel of teachers through the medium of an oral presentation.

Currently, students are in the process of planning and executing scientific experiments with the aid of sensors in areas such as physics, sport sciences, and astrophysics.

Groups are aiming to complete this project before the end of June this year.

Grant Funding


I'm very pleased to let you know that our P&C successfully bid for \$10,978 as part of the Parent Engagement grants from the ACT Education Directorate. This includes over \$9,000 for furniture in the canteen area which is being developed into the Engagement Hub. We want the Hub to be a space that is welcoming for students and a place that we can use for P&C events, concerts and gatherings.

The grant funds will also cover pull up banners, a yellow pop-up gazebo for outdoor and summer events, a Survey Monkey subscription. We were unsuccessful at requesting money for a new industrial microwave and coffee making machine for the canteen.

In addition to the \$5,000 we received earlier this year for canteen and menu redesign and the cookbook project, we have now received \$15,978 in funding to support our activities. Well done team.

LIBRARY NEWS

The library's session 2 program is well under way. During the first week of term two textbooks and English novels were loaned out to students. We thank students and staff for their patience during this time. Books loaned out for session two are due back on August 26, the final day of the end of session exams. When a student changes or withdraws from a subject the books for that subject fall due on the day that the change takes place. Students who are leaving Narrabundah College must return all books prior to departure.

Some students still have books that are overdue from session one and some students still have books that are overdue from last year and we ask that these books be returned over the next few days.

During 2021 Narrabundah College library is celebrating and recognising stories told through the lens of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander writers and illustrators. The library has developed a collection of short story picture books written and illustrated by talented, leading and emerging Indigenous authors and illustrators. Shirley Purdie's book *Shirley Purdie: My Story, Ngaginybe Jarragbe* and Kirli Saunders' book *Bindi* (illustrated by Dub Leffler) have both been shortlisted for the 2021 Children's Book Council awards (<https://www.cbca.org.au/shortlist-2021>).

All Indigenous books are carefully selected and sourced from preferred publishers such as Magabala Books. Magabala Books are Australia's leading publishers of books written and illustrated by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders. Magabala books are located in Broome, Western Australia (www.magabala.com). During 2020 Magabala Books was nominated for and winner of the prestigious Small Publisher of the Year Award at the Australian Book Industry Awards (ABIA) with a further three books shortlisted for other important literary awards. This year four of Magabala's titles have been nominated for ABIA awards (<https://abiawards.com.au/abia-2021-shortlist/>).

A large selection of Magabala's books and other Indigenous titles are currently on display in the library and we invite students and staff to share the experience of these creative and talented authors and illustrators.

HISTPHILENGPOL HAPPENINGS

LEGAL STUDIES

Last session, we were fortunate enough to have Lauren from Legal Aid come to our Legal Studies class to make an introduction to criminal law. Using the infamous Azaria Chamberlain case, Laura helped us understand the vagaries of the Australian criminal justice system. She took the class on a journey through the case, how such faults arise and what considerations must be taken. It astounded many in the class just how inaccurate and unfair the criminal investigation process was in the 1980s. It left us pondering how the system could serve victims with such injustice and the different social standards that came into play. A popular talking point in class was whether a husband should face as severe punishment as a mother, and how society's views on maternity may affect this. Overall, the experience certainly gave us much to consider about the reliability of our system in delivering justice – for suspects and victims. This is clearly a critical aspect to consider when studying criminal law.

Laura provides free legal advice to college students and their families at Narrabundah College every second Friday in the school library.

THE ETHICS OLYMPIAD — An ACT-wide competition entered by Year 11 Narrabundah students.

On Tuesday, several Year 11 students participated in the 2021 Ethics Olympiad held over zoom in two teams: Narrabundah Grey (Jaden O-D., Kevin J., Vanshika S., and Molly B-S), and Narrabundah Yellow (Alyssa H., Hilary G., Alix N., and Simone G.). We were given eight case studies surrounding relevant socio-political and pop culture issues to debate and discuss from ethical, philosophical, and critical lenses. There was a rich variety in the cases; from evaluating fans' responsibility when engaging in media created under exploitative conditions, to deconstructing Netflix shows' (Elite and Tiger King) portrayal of minorities using queer, feminist, and postmodernist analysis.

Scenarios and media which we had previously considered mundane evolved into complex debate topics as students were encouraged to use Kantian and Utilitarian perspectives to reflect upon aspects of daily life. Each heat was carried out over a structured Zoom meeting featuring timed responses from both teams, beginning with a 3-minute introduction, some back-and-forth discussion between teams, and then a final seven minutes of gruelling questioning from the judges.

This was the first Ethics Olympiad for my team, Narrabundah Grey, and none of us studies Philosophy because of the IB. After hearing philosophical jargon used by our competitors, such as the "categorical imperative of universality", we conferred as a group after quick research to share a quick rundown of Kantian philosophy. Despite these challenges, Narrabundah Grey won the Olympiad's gold medal; scoring enough points to beat every other school in the ACT! The news was a relieving surprise after six arduous hours of critical thinking on Tuesday, and this means that we qualify for the Australasian Championship, where we will compete against Australia's and New Zealand's top secondary students.

For any students interested in debating, mock trial, philosophy, or public speaking in general, I would highly recommend the challenge.
